








THE FY 2023 BUDGET - \$1.6 TRILLION IN OUTLAYS



HHS Office of Inspector General

- Office of Inspector General (OIG)
- Inspector General Act of 1978 established for oversight of major federal agencies
- Independent oversight agency within HHS with a focus on fraud, waste, and abuse
- > 1,600 employees (largest Inspector General's office in the Federal government)
- Oversight conducted from regional offices, headed by Regional IGs or Special Agents in Charge

OIG's Oversight Activities

To accomplish its mission, OIG conducts independent and objective investigations, audits, and evaluations to:

- Promote effective program management
- Keep the agency leadership and Congress informed
- Protect public health
- Save taxpayer dollars





OIG Work Plan



- Mandatory OIG reviews ex: MFCU, improper payments
- Requests from Congress *ex*: *alternative senior care*
- OIG Strategic Plan ex: core focus on execution
- Discussions with CMS and HHS ex: private equity in nursing homes
- Emerging issues *ex*: *concurrent emergencies*
- Unimplemented OIG recommendations ex: ADHD meds, food and drug recalls, placement in SNFs vs. IRFs



MFCUs

- 50 States, D.C., Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands
- Annually recertified by OIG
 - Assesses performance and compliance with Federal requirements
 - Administered a Federal grant for a portion of operating costs
