




Fiscal Results 2022 - Kaufman Hall






Fiscal Results 2023




Median Hospital Operating Margins Nationally, Year-to-Date






Missouri Hospital Fiscal State 2022















Federal Budget Conundrum




Federal Debt – April 1 \$34,578,609,157,179





Federal Budget Conundrum



- Revenue increased 5.7% between 2015 and 2023
- Spending increased29.1% between 2015 and2023
 - > Mandatory
 - Discretionary (~27% of spending)
 - > Supplemental

Interest is approximately 16% of spending - \$433B to maintain debt

118th Congress

- Election year
- 1/3 Senate (Senator Hawley) and all House up for election / reelection
- Concerns about spending





Funding the Federal Government

- FINALLY discretionary spending appropriations package enacted
 - Consolidated Appropriations Act (H.R. 4366 / H. Res. 1061)
 - Delayed Medicaid DSH payment reductions, extended MDH and enhanced low-volume payment adjustments and reduced the Medicare PFS payment cut to -1.7%
 - House 339 yeas, 85 nays and 8 not voting; Reps. Bush, Cleaver, Graves, Luetkemeyer, Smith and Wagner – yea, Reps. Alford and Burlison – nay
 - Senate 84 yeas, 22 nays and 3 not voting; Sen. Hawley and Schmitt nay
 - > Further Consolidated Appropriations Act (H.R. 2882 / H. Res. 1102)
 - Funds Health and Human Services
 - House 286 yeas, 134 nays and 12 not voting; Reps. Cleaver, Graves,
 Luetkemeyer and Smith yea, Reps. Alford, Burlison, Bush and Wagner nay
 - Senate 74 yeas, 24 nays and 2 not voting; Sen. Hawley and Schmitt nay



118th Congressional Advocacy Issues

- Block site-neutrality adjustments
 - Lower Costs, More Transparency Act (H.R. 5378 Rodgers, R-WA), the PATIENT Act (H.R. 3561 section 302 Rodgers, R-WA) and the Health Care Price Transparency Act (H.R. 4822 section 203 Smith, R-MO) adjusts clinician administered drug services
 - > SITE Act (S. 1869 Braun, R-IN) reduces Medicare payments for non-evaluation and management grandfathered HOPDs
 - Bipartisan Primary Care and Health Workforce Act (S. 2840 Sanders, I-VT) prohibit hospitals from charging E&M, OP behavioral health services and services furnished through telehealth facility fees in the commercial market
- Strengthen 340B
 - Enact PROTECT 340B Act (H.R. 2534 Spanberger, D-VA) prohibits insurer payment discrimination
 - Enact 340B PATIENTS Act (H.R. 7635 Matsui, D-CA) and support SUSTAIN 340B (Senate discussion draft section 3) prohibits contract pharmacy restrictions
- Temporary reinstatement of necessary provider status
 - ➤ Enact Save America's Rural Hospitals Act (H.R. 833 section 114 Graves, R-MO) restores state authority to grant necessary provider status
 - > Enact Rural Hospital Closure Relief Act (S. 1571 Durbin, D-IL) changes CAH eligibly
 - > Enact Rural Health Care Access (H.R. 1128 Green, R-TN) remove the 35-mile rule



118th Congressional Advocacy Issues

- Physician Recruitment
 - Enact Resident Physician Shortage Reduction Act (H.R. 2389 Sewell, D-AL / S. 1302 Menendez, D-NJ) adds 14,000 Medicare-funded residency slots
 - Enact The Conrad 30 and Physician Access Reauthorization Act (H.R. 4942 Schneider, D-IL / S. 665 Klobuchar, D-MN) extends Conrad 30 program for three years
 - > Enact Doctors in our Boarders Act (H.R. 4875 Lawler, R-NY) increase the number of Conrad 30 waivers to 100
- Block prescribed staffing
 - Enact Protecting America's Seniors' Access to Care Act (H.R. 7513 Fischbach, R-MN) minimum staffing
 - Block H.R. 7546 Matsui, D-CA) and S. 3860 Merkley, D-OR) limit overtime hours for nurses



118th Congressional Advocacy Issues

Telehealth

- ➤ Enact the Telehealth Modernization Act (H.R. 7623 Carter, R-GA)
- Enact the CONNECT for Health Act (H.R. 4189 Thompson, D-CA / S. 2016 Schatz, D-HI
- ➤ Enact the Medicare Telehealth Privacy Act (H.R. 6364 Balderson, R-OH)

Medicare Advantage

- > Enact the No UPCODE Act (S. 1002 Cassidy, R-LA)
- Urge Congress to ensure CMS holds MA plans accountable for implementing recently finalized MA rules – prior authorization and API



FY 2025 Budget: Cash Balances

- Recent cash balances of state funds are at historic highs
 - ➤ Cash balances have accrued from federal COVID relief payments, Medicaid matching fund enhancements and strong GR revenue growth in fiscal years 2021 and 2022
- The projected FY 2025 beginning GR fund balance is \$3.2 billion
 - > The average beginning GR balance in fiscal years 2017-2019 was \$30 million
- Medicaid-related balances from federal match rate bonuses (as of Dec. 31)
 - > \$724.7 M FMAP Enhancement Fund
 - > \$422 M Medicaid Stabilization Fund
 - > \$739 M FMAP Enhancement Expansion Fund
 - These "GR-equivalent" balances have been set aside to pay for Medicaid caseload growth due to continuous coverage requirements under the COVID PHE, and for Medicaid expansion

FY 25 Governor's Recommended Budget Totals

• FY 25 proposed operating budget: \$51.8 billion

▶ General Revenue \$14.7 billion – 4.1% (change from FY 24)

> Other State Funds \$11.4 billion - 23.5%

> Federal Funds \$25.7 billion + 42.4%

- The total proposed operating budget is 6.8% greater than the FY 24 budget passed by the General Assembly, and 38.1% greater than FY 23 spending
 - Past growth was driven the by federal pandemic relief funds, Medicaid expansion, transportation investments, slowing budget growth shows the influence of these factors is waning
- The Governor's proposed budget projects an ending FY 25 GR balance of \$1.6 billion
- Missouri House of Representatives adopted a lower budget of \$50.7 billion
